BRIGADIER-GENERAL FRANK WORMALD, DEWSBURY

Brigadier-General Frank Wormald, C.B., of Trowse House, Norwich, Norfolk, of the 12th Lancers, was a son of the late Mr. J. Wormald, of Dewsbury, and a member of the firm of Messrs. Wormalds and Walker, Limited, Dewsbury. He died on active service in France on the 3rd October last, leaving estate valued at £39,278 4s. 10d., with net personalty £25.674 8s. 10d. Mrs. Gwynifred Wormald, of Wingfield Manor, Alfreton, Derby, his widow, and Mr. Arthur Wormald, of Kimaith Hall, Gains-borough, Yorkshire, and Mr. Percival Henry Wormald, of Dewsbury Mills, Dewsbury, his brothers, are the executors. The will is dated 13th August, 1914, wherein testator left £500 and household and personal effects to his wife, and £100 each to the executors. The residue of his property is left in trust for his wife for life, and then to his children, and on failure of issue, to children of his brothers, John. Frederick William, Arthur, and Percival Henry.
